Emerging adulthood, which is a distinct life stage between adolescence and adulthood, requires important tasks including forming identity, attaining academic training, and exploring potential career paths (Arnett et al., 2014). One in five emerging adults experiences a mental illness, and the rate of substance use disorders is twice that of adults aged 26 and older (Rosenberg, 2016 Temporomandibular disorders (TMDs) are a group of painful and/or dysfunctional disorders associated with the masticatory muscles, temporomandibular joints (TMJs), and related structures [1], and are a grow– ing public health problem.
