After the structure and discipline of a five-day high school schedule, the freedom and flexibility of a college course load can lead some students to forget to behave with decorum and responsibility in the classroom. A digital recorder for recording lectures or a laptop for note-taking may also be appropriate if allowed by the course instructor. As tempting as it is to attend class in your pajamas or sweaty gym outfit, a disheveled appearance gives the impression of irresponsibility and disrespect, regardless of how studiously you behave in the classroom. Bring along all appropriate materials you might need during class, including course textbooks, notebooks and writing implements for taking notes, course handouts and appropriately completed assignments. Pay attention to all lectures, demonstrations, multimedia presentations and guest lecturers, regardless of your level of interest in the subjects or materials. College Classroom Etiquette Assess your attire to ensure you're dressed appropriately. Avoid arriving late or even right under the wire, as this is a sign of disrespect to instructors who might perceive tardiness as a sign that you feel your time is more valuable than theirs. Disrespectful and irresponsible classroom behavior in college can sabotage your chances of passing the class and could also damage your reputation with faculty members. Secure your educational success and please your professors by adopting these college classroom behaviors. You never know what information presented might appear on future exams, and you might miss assignment details that you'll ultimately be responsible for completing These items might include your cell phone, food or drinks, non-course-related books or magazines, MP3 players or other mobile devices. Clothing should be neat and tidy; however, there is no need to dress formally or to wear business-casual attire. Turn off and put away any items that might cause a distraction to yourself or your .fellow students. Arrive at class at least five minutes early
