In today's information–rich environment, it's crucial for independent learning, bridging the information gap, and fostering critical thinking for economic and cultural progress. Information literacy also addresses copyright and authorship concerns. Key dimensions include media literacy (accessing, analyzing, and creating media), network literacy (computer and network skills), digital literacy (using digital devices), scientific literacy (understanding scientific concepts), and visual literacy (interpreting visual information). .Ultimately, information literacy empowers individuals and enables participation in society
