Gas Chromatography is an analytical technique used to separate and identify chemical compounds in a mixture. Common detectors include Flame Ionization Detector (FID), Thermal Conductivity Detector (TCD), and Electron Capture Detector (ECD). Carrier Gas: An inert gas (like helium or nitrogen) carries the vaporized sample through the column.
