Waterfall is best suited for projects with well-understood, stable requirements, where change is minimal, and a predictable process is essential. Limited Flexibility: Once a phase is complete, revisiting or altering it is often challenging and costly. Predictability: Waterfall's structured approach and upfront planning provide a clear view of timelines, costs, and project scope.
