 - Nora's panic intensifies, and she contemplates drastic measures to escape the situation.
- The Tarantella Dance: A metaphor for Nora's frantic attempt to keep her life from unraveling.
 - The dance becomes a symbol of Nora's desperation, as she tries to buy time before Krogstad's letter is revealed.
 - The act ends on a tense note, as Nora awaits the inevitable confrontation.
 - The mounting tension sets the stage for the climactic revelations of Act 3.
- Themes of power, control, and morality are further explored as Nora faces the consequences of her past actions.
