It is typically given before the Eid prayers to ensure that all members of the community can participate in the festivities, especially the less fortunate. – Egyptians donate food, money, or clothing to ensure everyone is provided for during the holiday. 3. **Feasting and Special Foods**: – After a month of fasting, Egyptians celebrate with a **grand feast**. Families gather for a hearty breakfast, often breaking their fast with dates, followed by a large meal. Popular foods include **fata**, a dish made with layers of rice, bread, and meat, and **kushari**, a mix of lentils, rice, pasta, and spicy tomato sauce. – Special sweets are a highlight of Eid. **Kahk** (traditional Eid cookies filled with dates, nuts, or Turkish delight and dusted with powdered sugar) are commonly baked at home or bought from pastry shops. 4. **Visiting Family and Friends**: – Eid is a time for **family gatherings**. People visit their relatives, exchange gifts, and share meals. It is also common to visit friends and neighbors, spreading joy and building social bonds. Children often receive **Eidiya**, small gifts of money from parents and older relatives, which they use to buy treats or toys. 5. **Public Celebrations and Entertainment**: – **Public parks, gardens, and amusement parks** are bustling during Eid, as families enjoy the festive atmosphere. Egyptians love spending time outdoors, so after their meals, many families go to parks or take Nile cruises. – **Cultural festivals, concerts, and street performances** are also organized in many cities. Folk music and dance performances are held, adding to the lively atmosphere. 6. **Decorations and Festive Atmosphere**: – In preparation for Eid, homes and streets are often decorated with **colorful lights and banners**. The night before Eid, children sometimes hang paper lanterns or set off fireworks, celebrating the arrival of the festival. – In marketplaces, shops sell new clothes, sweets, and gifts, with vendors offering brightly colored balloons and toys for children, creating a festive vibe. 7. **Sharing with the Less Fortunate**: – In the spirit of Eid, many Egyptians go out of their way to **share food and gifts with the less fortunate**.
