

Do vs. Make English Vocabulary Do and Make are two verbs which frequently confuse students. (done = washed) I'll do the kitchen if you do the lawns (do = clean, do = mow) Remember Do can also be as an auxiliary verb (for making questions in the present tense – Do you like chocolate?) Here we will be talking about Do as a normal verb.-----&&----- Do vs. Make Comparison The difference between do and make

Do :

- o Work, Jobs and Tasks: Do the housework, the homework, a good task
- o Non-Specific Activities: Do something, nothing, anything, everything
- o Replace Verb when Obvious: Do your hair, the dishes, the exam, the laundry

Make :

- o Food, Drink and Meals: Make a cake, breakfast, dinner, a cup of coffee
- o Product Material /Origin : Made of gold, in China, by me, from grapes
- o Produce a Reaction Make your eyes water, you sleepy, you happy, you smile
- o Plans and Decisions: Make arrangement, a choice, a decision, a plan
- o Speaking and Sounds Make a noise, a comment, a speech, a suggestion

A Short list for common words used with "Do" and "Make":

Do : a job, work, damage, harm, a quiz, homework, studies, sport, hobby, vest, good, better, wrong, exercise, project, a report, research, washing, shopping, favor, heart transplant, drugs, post graduates, ironing

Make : a decision, a suggestion, a speech, phone call, parts for, the bed, mistake, no effort, make use of, make sure, an offer, dinner, money, fun of, a discovery, promise, prediction, friends

o The watches were made in Switzerland We also use Make for producing an action or reaction :

- o Onions make your eyes water. Make is for producing, constructing, creating or building something new. It is also used to indicate the origin of a product or the materials that are used to make something.

- o Zero and definite article with languages and people
- o If we use the same word for the language and the people who live in the country, we use zero articles with the language and the definite article with the people. DO is used when we refer to activities in general without being specific. DO is used as follows:

1. DO is used when talking about work, jobs or tasks.
 - o I have guests visiting tonight so I should start doing the housework now.
 - o I wouldn't like to do that job.
2. In these cases, we normally use words like thing, something, nothing, anything, everything etc. I've got things to do! We sometimes use DO to replace a verb when the meaning is clear or obvious. This is more common in informal spoken English:
 - o Do I need to do my hair?
 - o The house was made of adobe.
 - o Wine is made from grapes.
3. You make before certain nouns about plans and decisions :
 - o He has made arrangements to finish work early.
4. We use Make with nouns about speaking and certain sounds :
 - o She made a nice comment about my dress.
5. We use Make with Food, Drink and Meals :
 - o I made a cake for her birthday.

Here we will learn about the difference between Do and Make and when to use each one. When do you use DO? Note, they do not produce any physical object.

- o Have you done your homework?
- 2. o Hurry up!
- o Don't just stand there – do something!
- o Is there anything I can do to help you?
- 3. (do = brush or comb)
- o Have you done the dishes yet?
